MVNU CELEBRATES 50 YEARS

Oct. 12, 1968, marked a very special day in MVNU history: its conception. There is much elation and exhilaration on campus as everyone has been celebrating 50 years of educating the hearts and minds of thousands. Since early August, facilities services personnel have been buzzing around putting up new banners on the light posts honoring certain people throughout the years.

The festivities started with a chapel service that had MVNU 50th anniversary shirts draped over every chair in the chapel. Dr. Linda Nease Scott (Class of '70) graced the students with a little blast from the past as she reflected on her time at MVNU.

"I had no choice in where I would

be attending college because my dad was the president," said Scott, "But Gods' plan was better than mine." Scott wanted to connect with the student in a way that they would understand, so she cleverly said, "Believe it or not, we were just like you all -- 18, 19, and 21 year olds sitting in chapel ... without the cell phones, of course. We shared one phone per dorm floor." There were many chuckles that rumbled throughout the auditorium; and instantly, there was a sense of togetherness in the chapel.

Following the chapel service, a ribbon-cutting ceremony took place at the Stephen W. Nease Center which will house the university's engineering program and a community makerspace, in partnership with Knox Labs.

The building was gifted to MVNU from Ariel Foundation. Engineering major Tagg Edgell was at the ceremony and was super excited to be there. "This ceremony bridges the gap between past engineers and students who are going through that process now. It is an honor to meet the people who have paved the way for us" said Edgell.

MVNU is also looking to celebrate the 50-year milestone in No-

vember during homecoming, which will include Cougar basketball, the MVNU Alumni Experience and the beloved rambunctious mascot Casey Cougar.

The Mount Vernon Church of the Nazarene congregations, MVNU alumni and the community will also join together and celebrate the work of God through MVNU and the community with special speaker Dr. Jesse Middendorf.

Bridges reflects on 50 years at MVNU

One-half century of memories and tremendous growth has taken place and filled the minds of many at 800 Martinsburg Road since MVNU was dedicated in October 1968. From its humble beginnings to the evolution of the diverse liberal arts college it is today, MVNU has stood solid as a symbol of educational excellence while holding true to the values of The Church of the Nazarene. Among the numerous faculty members who have served their mission at MVNU is Bill Bridges.

Bridges was hired as the fourth faculty member by MVNU in 1967 and began in October 1968 as professor in the speech communications department. It was a two-year curriculum at the time and expanded to a four-year program in 1970 with the first bachelor's degrees being conferred in 1974. Bridges also taught drama classes and was adviser for the drama club. Bridges recalled that the first drama production, "The Staring Match," took place on campus in "The Barn."

After serving 12 years at MVNU, Bridges then felt inclined to return to his pastoral ministries, turning

the department over to Dr. Henry Smith. Bridges considers Smith to be the "Father of WNZR" but also sees himself as the "Grandfather of WNZR." He served different churches for 11 years before moving to Mid-American Nazarene University to work in the church relations department, directing the public relations groups. Bridges also served on the board of trustees for MVNU, representing two different districts.

"Our goal all along was to become a four-year institution," said Bridges. "We dreamed about it (college growth). It was difficult to envision what it might be.

Bridges admitted that often when he steps on campus today, his mind goes back to 1968 and how the school has developed from that point. Completion of the R.R. Hodges Chapel building is what he sees as a major accomplishment for the campus. He considers it a "dream come true" after telling his students that someday there would be a theater on campus. He considers it a privilege to be able to act the production "Lilies of the Field" in

“I didn’t really pursue the job, and Dr. Spaulding didn’t necessarily pursue me,” Waal said. In the end, Waal got the job, and now he is excited to work with the student body.

“In admissions, you meet students who may or may not come to MVNU,” Waal said. “In student life, there is more of an opportunity for long-term relationships.”

Waal did say he would miss the admissions department, as they have been his family for the past nine years, though he expects the same bond can be formed with the student life office.

The student voice is one of Waal’s primary focuses as he’s been trying to “intentionally talk to as many students as he can.” Waal’s been spending time in the “caf,” eating with students in order to further this goal.

A survey went out in September, giving students an opportunity to help student life serve this campus, according to Waal. Student life oversees athletics, the counseling office, residence life, campus life, intercultural life and campus safety.

When it comes to his approach to the new position, Waal said he “wants to create an environment where students can live to their God-given potential. When someone comes to me with a proposal, my first question is going to be ‘how does this help students reach their God-given potential?’”

Waal recognizes that there are big shoes to fill accepting a position formerly held by Joe Noonan. “I can’t imagine how Joe was able to hold both this position and the student chaplain as well as he did” Waal said. “It’s a true testament to him and his heart for serving.”

Engineering department opens in downtown Mount Vernon

This year, MVNU has added an off-campus facility for the engineering program which was added mainly due to market demand. MVNU’s Dr. David Che said, “It was in response to the inquiry of the parents of prospective students who asked ‘Hey, do you have engineering?’”

The new facility opened on Sept. 7, and classes in the new building have since begun. “We’ve passed the state inspections, so everything is ready except for a few things here and there,” Che said.

The program entails a four-year education with a bachelor’s degree in science and engineering. Che said, “After four years, [the students are] ready to solve real world problems. I think it’s a good fit because MVNU fits the Nazarene tradition. The school motto is ‘To seek to learn is to seek to serve,’ and how

do you serve?” Che asked.

Che looks towards applying engineering to missions. “I’ve been talking to a retired MVNU professor who’s leading an outreach in Brazil,” He said. “We have churches there, but people don’t have jobs. How do we tap into their resources? How do you put them together and create business opportunities? That’s where engineering comes in.”

Looking toward the future, Che said, “The program has been growing. We have close to 60 students; of them we have roughly 20 freshmen. It’s growing, and we expect the program to bring in new students.”

Che hopes to keep the program going strong in the future, saying “Maybe in 10 years we can grow up to 200 students. There are more and more students who have a passion to serve the kingdom through engineering.”

"We are doing the interim, because we want to do the search well," VanNest said. "This is too

The process of finding a new chaplain is extensive, requiring a large search and review of candidates.

"We want to find a chaplain who can be a pastoral presence on this campus, not just to student's, but to faculty and staff as well," VanNest said.

The job opening will be re-opened in the spring.

"We want to find the right person

to fill the hole," VanNest said. "We all want to be praying for the future and what that looks like."

Until then, VanNest is making plans for the current semester.

"We want to look at everything we do; are there things we could be doing better in developing spiritual lives of students?" he asked.

VanNest is looking forward to the upcoming semester.

"I'm excited to be in chapel more. It's a reflection of who we are," he said. "I'm also excited just working with the chaplain staff."

The chaplain staff runs most of the daily operations, which allows more time for his other responsibilities.

This year, VanNest has been promoted to dean of the MVNU School of Theology and Philosophy.

"It's a rough start; a lot happens at the beginning of the year," VanNest said.

Dr. VanNest joined the faculty of MVNU as a professor of pastoral ministries in the fall of 2016.

"I really believed that I wanted

to spend the rest of my ministry preparing people for their ministry, he said.

VanNest served as a pastor for 17 years and was the district superintendent of the Southwestern Ohio District for nine years.

VanNest is from Cincinnati, OH. He is a graduate of MidAmerica Nazarene University, Nazarene Theological Seminary and United Theological seminary.

At this point, I pray this continues to be the pattern."
